Many parents become less involved with school activities as their children move from elementary to high school. Yet teenagers really do benefit when their parents show an interest. That could be showing an interest in school, church, or another area like 4-H.

Parental support includes encouraging youth to work toward their "personal best", they are less likely to become depressed or involved in harmful, violent, or drug related behaviors. But remember, "personal best" does not mean perfection.

Youth that participate in extracurricular activities like 4-H are typically known to likely do better in school. The 4-Her's work ethic and youth leadership bubbles over into school. 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WISCONSIN 4-H YOUTH DEVELOPMENT CODE OF CONDUCT

Reminder that the following code of conduct is in effect for all 4-H club, county and beyond activities. The code of conduct is what was agreed to in the 4-H Online registration form.

As a 4-H youth or adult participant, I will...

- * Be curious to learn.
- * Be respectful to self and others.
- * Work to positively resolve problems or differences.
- * Accept guidance from Extension volunteers and staff.
- * Follow program rules, curfews, dress codes, policies and rules of the facility being used.
- * Use appropriate language, exhibit good sportsmanship, and be a positive role model.
- * Comply with local, state and federal laws.
- * Abstain from use of alcohol, illicit drugs, and tobacco during any 4-H program, activity or educational experience.
- * Fully participate in scheduled activities and orientations.
- Respect others' property and privacy rights.
- Abstain from child abuse (physical, sexual, emotional and neglect), harassment, hazing and bullying.
- * Refrain from all sexual activity/contact during any 4-H program, activity or educational activity.
- * Accept personal responsibility for behavior including any financial damage.
- * Follow safety rules.

Consequences for violating any part of this Code of Conduct may include but are not limited to...

- * Removal from leadership positions held.
- * Removal from participation in the event in which the code of Conduct has been violated (at the individual's expense).
- * Forfeiture or repayment of financial support for the event.
- * Sanctions on participation in future 4-H events.
- Suspension of membership
- Dismissal from 4-H.

4-H Leader Enrollments

Don't forget that ALL 4-H leaders should enroll every year so you remain active as a leader in our system. It also allows you to continue to receive the newsletter and to let us recognize you accurately for your years of service. Plus, it is a state requirement that we get the signed list of volunteer behavior guidelines annually. The state is also requiring that we now do criminal background checks on our volunteers every four years. To enroll go to 4honline.com and click on Wisconsin!

4-H volunteer leaders please take note that you are required to complete the mandated reporter training that is on 4-H online. If you completed Youth Protection Training and have not let your 4-H enrollment lapse you are not required to do this training as it was part of the youth protection training.

Inclement Weather/Cancellation Policy

Langlade County 4-H programs (county, club and groups) are automatically canceled if any of the following occur:

-Langlade County or the location where the event is scheduled to occur is under a Winter Storm, Wind Chill, Tornado, Blizzard or Severe Thunderstorm Warning issued by the National Weather Service

Volunteer's In Preparation Training

In order to be recognized as a 4-H volunteer in the Wisconsin 4-H youth development program, all adults age 18 years and older must complete the Volunteers In Preparation (VIP) training. The purpose of this training is to ensure the safety and well-being of all participants. VIP training is step 3 of 4 to become a certified leader in 4-H and for your years of service to count. <u>VIP replaces Youth Protection Training</u>

<u>Steps to become a certified 4-H leader:</u>

- 1. Enroll on 4-Honline to become a leader
- 2. Complete background check
- 3. Complete Volunteers In Preparation training
- 4. Complete the Mandated Reporter training found on 4-H online.

*Once you have completed ALL of these steps then you are considered a certified 4-H leader.

YOUTH STAFF POSITION DESCRIPTIONS & EXPECTATIONS 2019 BASE & OUTPOST CAMP HELD IN LANGLADE COUNTY, WI JULY 8-12, 2019

Welcome to the newly formed North Central WI Quad County 4-H Camp program with Langlade, Lincoln, Oneida, and Price county 4-H programs. New this year we will be offering three different 4-H camps for campers in grades K-9th grade.

Day Camp – Counselors must be in 8th Grade and Older with no previous experience required. This camp is a one-day experience for our 4-H members in grades 5K-3. Counselors may participate in this camp, as well as, choose between one of the other two camp choices. *Date: July 8, 2019*

Base Camp Information – Counselors must be 8th Grade and Older with no previous experience required. This traditional camp will be held at Camp Susan in Deerbrook, WI for 3rd-6th Grade Campers. Campers will lodge in cabins. *Date: July 9-12, 2019*

Out Post Camp Information – Counselors should have at least 2 years of counselor experience. Camp will be held at the newly created Scout Camp County Park in Pickerel, WI. This camp will have a rustic feel that include lodging in tents (but with showers and flush toilets), cooking over a fire, activities will focus on adventure, skill building and wildlife ecology, with plenty of canoeing, swimming, and fun around the evening campfires. *Date: July 9-12, 2019*

QUALIFICATIONS:

- Current 8th grade or older
- Willingness to be creative, energetic and compassionate
- Ability to lead and support others

POSITION DESCRIPTIONS: (You are encouraged to apply for more than one position. Positions are made available based on the strengths of the candidates and the needs of the overall camp program.)

a. JR. DIRECTORS Base Camp: Up to 4 Selected & Outpost Camp: Up to 2 Selected

This role includes camp leadership along with being a resource to counselors. Youth should have 3 or more years of counselor experience. Responsible for program/theme planning with camp committee. Also assist with staf/counselor planning and training meetings. Responsible for planning and integrating the camp theme into camp fire times, leading songs, and skits. Encourage campers and all staff to be involved as all camp programs. Also includes additional assignments with campers or general camp operation as assigned by the Adult Camp Director or 4-H Program Coordinator. Jr. Directors will be most effective if they attend the whole camp experience. These Jr. Directors will also have roles at the Day Camp.

b. **<u>RESOURCE COUNSELORS</u>**: Base Camp: Up to 20 Selected & Outpost Camp: Up to 4 Selected

Responsible for the day-to-day supervision of up to 12 campers in a cabin or cabin-side. Responsible for escorting campers to and from all scheduled activities and assisting or participating in camp activities. Resource Counselors will be effective if they attend the whole camp experience. Any absences during camp due to school or 4-H programs must be pre-approved prior to the May 7th meeting. Please plan ahead. Base Camp Resource Counselors will choose one of the following duties.

- A. *Recreation*: Responsible for planning recreation and activities as well as facilitating reflection on personal strengths and development from these activities
- B. *Camp Crafts*: Responsible for planning and leading craft or take-home activities and projects that will appeal to a broad variety of ages, genders and interests of campers.
- C. Waterfront: Responsible for all swimming and waterfront activities for both swimmer and non-swimmer campers.
- D. Nature: Responsible for planning and organizing nature and/environmental lessons and activities.

APPLICATION PROCESS:

1. *Submit the attached form* no later than February 7, 2019. A completed 4-H Reference Form from a teacher, 4-H leader and/or other community contact (cannot be a relative.) must be returned by the application due date.

2. Attend Camp Youth Staff Meetings. All North Central WI Quad County 4-H Summer Camp Youth Staff are required to attend the Camp Staff Training and Planning Sessions. Please mark them on your calendars and reserve the dates.
